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Session Types

The Charting the LifeCourse Showcase will feature a few types of sessions, letting people pick and choose from sessions that align with their interests and learning styles. The types of sessions we are looking for are summarized below.

60 minute Interactive Presentation

An individual or small group will lead an interactive discussion or exercise for 60 minutes. Presenters should not "present" for more than 20% of the session.

60-minute Panel Presentation: all panelists are identified

A panel is a group of thematically linked presentations and a designated moderator. Each of the two or three panelists submitting this proposal together will present for 20 minutes.

Diversity among roles, professions, and organizations is strongly encouraged on each panel (i.e.: a panel might include a state system staff or administrator, support coordinator, family member and self-advocate presenting various elements of one project; groups from multiple organizations within the state presenting on family support efforts in their state; or presenters from multiple teams showcasing the different ways each uses CtLC for reframing and messaging).

The conference committee will not accept submitted panel sessions where there is only one presenter who is an author on multiple presentations. Please use this submission format only if you have a common theme and between three and five distinct presentations and presenters. We will assign a moderator for your panel unless your team elects to identify your own.

20 minute Presentation: will be combined with others

If accepted, you will present for 20 minutes along with two or three others who submit proposals on a theme similar to yours. The committee will select the abstracts to be presented with yours, doing our best to ensure thematically linked and compelling combinations. Because several presentations will be combined into one timeslot, only one speaker per proposal is permitted. We will assign a moderator to the session to contact all presenters before the session to keep time, and facilitate a question and answer session during the session.

All AV, including microphones, a podium or table, an LCD projector, and a screen, will be provided by UMKC. Presenters are responsible for bringing a single PowerPoint (combination sessions are encouraged to communicate beforehand and create a seamless presentation to avoid delays in the session while switching machines).

Proposals submitted but not accepted in one of these format may be offered a poster slot at the CtLC in Action Expo instead.
